Ready or not...it's almost time to open the Plant Clinic for another season of business! The Master Gardener Plant Clinic is one of the most visible, helpful things we do for our community. Your volunteer hours are vital to the success of this program.

and sometimes I wonder what took me so long. But, I know that things happen at the right time and my boys were little then (Lord knows I never had time for a garden then!!) Like my sweet, old Armenian neighbor, it's about giving and sharing.

Barb's Memorial for Oldest Son Patrick who died February 13, 2005 after a 5 ½ year battle with Lou Gehrig's disease.

At the old Mission grounds an Apple Tree grew for many years. Every year it blossomed in glory with its pink and white blossoms and continued to do so long after that building was no longer used and fell into disrepair.

Several years later the new Church of Saint Therese was established. One night, someone (or some ones) decided that the tree would look especially fine near the Church. Even though they had probably been "imbibing", they proceeded to move the Apple Tree.

Now, any of you who have transplanted a tree know that there are several points to remember and follow:

1. Dig a large hold, adequate for size of the tree.
2. Very carefully dig up the tree.
3. **ESPECIALLY TAKE CARE TO GET AS MANY ROOTS AS POSSIBLE.**
4. Gently transport tree.
5. Carefully place tree into hole.
6. Cover with dirt from the hole.
7. Be certain tree is standing straight.
8. Fertilize.

## 9. Water and continue to do so frequently.

Several days later, upon inspection, it seems the tree had NOT been transplanted keeping these pointers in mind and in addition, it leaned very strongly toward the Church. And so... much TLC was given to the Apple Tree. Eventually one of the "Imbibers" brought a huge rock and leaned the tree against it. A strong chain, later removed, was lovingly placed around the tree and rock for moral support.

To this day, an interesting question remains...Why was the Apple Tree moved between the Church and the status of Saint Therese, rather than taken up the alley by the parking lot where it was transplanted?

Of course the other question that was asked was... Will the Apple Tree live? Summer and Autumn days passed quickly. Winter came and finally gave up to Spring. Imagine the surprise of many and the excitement, joy, and wonder of all as the Apple put forth its first tiny buds that burst into spectacular pink and white blossoms. Some years later, it was wondered by some if the tree should be pruned to it didn't lean so much toward the Church. The replay was, "No, it is leaning to the Church for strength." Remember this story...

Donna was Pat's rock. Kristen and Joe were the unseen chain. Together they gave sunshine, showers, and sustenance to Pat for his journey to God.

When Spring returns this year, as it does every year, believers, unbelievers, and doubters, please ponder the wonderful exciting and glorious idea of Resurrection. Remember pat... and the "Imbibers".
